Two reports cited in this week's clips reveal just how out-ofstep we are with other states in funding higher education. For years we've been told most states were slashing higher ed budgets, too. Well, that's not true anymore. According to a study in the Chronicle of Higher Education, most states have determined they can't continue starving their colleges and 2013 higher ed funding is now rebounding. Louisiana ranks third in states cutting the most between 2008-2011 and is expected to cut funding another 5% this year.

A second study entitled "College Funding in Context" includes Louisiana as a case study. These researchers concluded that since Louisiana's economy relies on low-skilled jobs, our people and politicians don't see the need to fund higher education. The study also notes Louisiana leads the nation as a top brain drain state.

Perhaps it is time to revisit how we fund higher ed.



- State appropriations for higher ed have been dropping nationwide since 2008 until this most recent year, with state spending rebounding in most states. Louisiana is one of the unfortunate states expected to continue the nosedive after already ranking third in the nation in cuts since 2008.
