Court Ruling Against LSU Supervisors

District Court Judge Janice Clark took little time on Friday before ruling the LSU System had to "immediately produce" the names of the finalists for the LSU President's job. The system is still holding the names, however, saying they are confident they will win on appeal.

Dear Johnette,

The Trustees of Louisiana College in Pineville meet tonight to discuss a painful development: the loss of the school's biggest donor in its history. The anonymous donor, who had reportedly pledged \$60 million to the School of Divinity, has withdrawn support from the college after giving the school just \$5 million of the pledged amount. In a letter to trustees he wrote, "We deeply regret we must now discontinue that support due to actions of President Aguillard which we believe to be unethical and potentially illegal." Both the donor and the departing Dean of the Divinity School have alleged Aguillard misappropriated some of the funds, using them for other purposes including a project in Tanzania and costs associated with the proposed Judge Paul Pressler School of Law.

We may still find out the names of the finalists for the LSU President's position even though Dr. F. King Alexander has already been selected and signed a contract. State media outlets took the LSU Supervisors to court this month claiming they violated the law by keeping the names of the finalists a secret. The media have won the first round with a district judge ordering the Supervisors to release the names. LSU is working on an appeal.

A Senate committee has passed SB204, Senator Robert Adley's (R-Benton) legislation that would allow community colleges and technical schools to bypass the traditional capital outlay process and secure funds by finding private partners and getting loans from the general fund. Historically, the Board of Regents has received requests from all the systems, prioritized them, and submitted them to the capital outlay system. The bill now heads to the Senate floor.
