Despite the Grambling troubles which have dominated the news for the last week, it has been a good week for our schools in NWLA. Louisiana Tech was named among the top five schools in the country for math whizzes while Centenary landed an even higher spot this year on the Kiplinger Personal Finance list of best values among private colleges.

The University of Louisiana Board of Supervisors has also just approved Northwestern State University's proposal to begin offering a Doctor of Nursing Practice Degree. The Board of Regents will review the proposal in December, and if passed by the Regents, Northwestern will have all state approvals to begin offering the degree.

The SBBA has been working with Northwestern over the past several months to help them demonstrate the need and demand for more highly trained nurse practitioners in Northwest Louisiana.
