Dear Johnette,

The 2014 session of the Louisiana Legislature kicked off today and education bills are front and center. It appears everyone, even Governor Jindal, has concluded we must quit slashing higher education funding if we are to produce the skilled workforce needed for the new jobs headed to the state.

Legislators are also showing signs of readiness to deal with the ballooning TOPS budget. House Speaker Chuck Kleckley, R - Lake Charles, has introduced legislation to raise the eligibility requirements to receive the TOPS award. Currently students with a 2.5 GPA and 20 on the ACT can receive the award. Kleckley would gradually increase the minimal requirement to receive TOPS to a 3.0 GPA with a 24 cumulative average on the ACT.

And congratulations to Larry Clark, who was selected by LSU President F. King Alexander to serve as Chancellor of LSU Shreveport. Clark is currently serving as Dean of the Cameron School of Business at the University of North Carolina Wilmington. Clark previously served as the Dean of the College of Business at LSUS from 1985 to 1994.
