For the second year in a row, Bossier Parish Community College is a finalist for the highly prestigious Bellwether Award given by the Community College Futures Assembly. A team from BPCC will present at the Assembly's conference on Monday and find out the following day if they received the grand prize.

BPCC is being recognized for its highly innovative and successful Open Campus Initiative which allows students to receive online instruction in math and English at no charge. The program was developed to provide additional assistance to students currently enrolled in math and English classes as well as serve as a preparatory program for those testing for college placement. For many students this program has helped them increase their placement score and thus avoid costly and time-consuming remedial coursework.

The program is not limited to BPCC students. In fact, the program's 30,000 students come from all 50 states and 189 foreign countries. *Shreveport Times, 01.23.17*

- At 38 colleges across the country, there are more students from families in the top 1% income bracket than there are students from the entire bottom 60% income bracket.
